

Patriot Elizabeth Duncan Porter Jackson County, Missouri (1750-1845)

Elizabeth Duncan Porter assisted in establishing American Independence as a prisoner of the British and allied Shawnee Indians. She was taken from Virginia in June 1780 to Quebec, Canada for the duration of the war.

Elizabeth (daughter of Thomas Dunkin and Elizabeth Alexander) was born 1750, Lancaster County, Pennsylvania; died 11 Apr 1845, Jackson County, Missouri; and buried Union Cemetery, Kansas City, Jackson County, Missouri. Elizabeth married Samuel Porter 1775, Knox County, Kentucky. Samuel was born 1735, Virginia; and died 1820, Virginia. Samuel assisted in establishing American Independence as a Private, Virginia Militia. Children:
