



Patriot Ledstone Noland Jackson County, Missouri 1750-1839

Ledstone Noland assisted in establishing American Independence as a Private, Capt John Johnson's Fork Ranger Unit and in Capt Gabriel Knox' Company, Col Smith's Regiment, North Carolina Militia. Ledstone's service is documented in his pension application S16992 at the U.S. National Archives & Records Administration.

Ledstone (son of Daniel Noland and Henrietta Smallwood) was born 1750, Charles County, Maryland; died 6 July 1839, Jackson County, Missouri; and buried Pitcher Cemetery, Independence, Jackson County, Missouri. Ledstone first married Elizabeth Glascock in 1770, Rowan County, North Carolina. Elizabeth was born 1755, Richmond, Virginia; and died 1800, Douglas County, Missouri. Children:

- Lena Noland (1774-1847).

- William Noland (1776-1851). William married Catherine Callender
- Jane Noland (1778-1860).

- Ledstone Noland Jr. (1783-1811). Ledstone Jr. married Mary Barb.
- Elizabeth Noland (1785-1855). Elizabeth married John Moore.
- Sarah Noland (1787-1869).
- Rebecca Noland (1789-1860). Rebecca married Michael Collins.
- Henry Noland (1793-). Henry married Elizabeth Pritcher.

Ledstone next married Mary Smallwood on 20 February 1801, Rowan County, North Carolina. Children:

- Susan Noland (1803-).

Pitcher Cemetery is located at 3306 Blue Ridge Boulevard, Independence, Jackson County, Missouri. It is a small pioneer graveyard established in 1830 and open to the public. Ledstone's gravesite is near the entrance in the Noland family plot at coordinates N39° 03' 49.572" and W94° 28' 14.59".
